


Fun with flags




Everyday energy use



Montrose Port enjoys a central location at the heart of the town and has grown steadily throughout its 527 year history. During this time it has been an important centre for various types of fishing, from salmon to whaling and herring, and for a time a pearly fishery in the river itself. It has also been an important timber port, and for many centuries was one of Scotland's largest exporters of wool.

Over the centuries the cargo and work carried out at the Port has evolved with approximately 70% of work in 2019 coming from the offshore energy sector through Oil & Gas and Renewables.

Did you know Quaker oats get brought through Montrose Port on their journey to your cereal bowl?!




Bjorg comes to visit!

Below is the Scurdie Ness Lighthouse outline to colour in.


